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Mystery surrounding the circumstances of the death of a visitor to an Exeter fair on Saturday evening was not fully cleared up at the inquest held by Exeter city coroner, Mr. W. Backwood, yesterday afternoon. Thomas Rodd, 65, farm labourer, of Venteville, Newton St. Cyres, whose body was recovered from the River Exe, not far from the fair ground on Hadden Road, aged 81, was found dead in the Exeter at seven o'clock. Witness heard the alarm of a man being in the river, and joined in the search, but did not know who he was. They also went about looking for Rodd, without success, though they searched the river banks for some time. Rodd did not think Rodd got into the water on purpose, or that anybody else had swum, and did not think Rodd had been rescued could not swim. Dr. Richard Gray, deputy police surgeon, Exeter, who was called in to respiration had been carried out on a stretcher, and witness continued the efforts, but there was no sign of life. At 10.15 a.m. the body was examined, the body and found no marks of violence. In his opinion, death was due to drowning.

Frederick George Gregory, 13, Church Park-road, St. Thomas, both cleric and ferryman, said he was required.
